November Images are due by Friday, November 3rd:

Y ou may submit two images in the same category or one image in each. If you would like to share a "before and after" version of one or both images, the before and after versions would count as only one submission each. The



idea of

before and after is to show how you, as the maker, chose to edit your image to improve it and is a great teaching tool for everyone. This could be as simple as a crop or applying more advanced editing tools. Please note this is optional.

We will not have assigned commenters for this meeting and will instead have an "open mic" format for commenting as we did for our September meeting.

If you have images but are unable to attend in person,



we ask that you include your comments to accompany your photos. These will be read by the host of the meeting.

Send images to projectmyimages@biphotoclub.org Images should be in jpg format and no larger than 3000 pixels on long edge or a max of 4000 pixels wide and 2000 pixels high for panos. They should be titled with a "M" or "G", and then your initials or three letters of your choice and a consecutive number in the order you wish them to be shown, image title and your name.jpg.

Sample Theme submission: M_PAE1_Title of Image_Maker's Name.jpg

M_PAE2_Title of Image_Maker's Name.jpg

If not submitting a Theme image but another image, title your images as above and substitute a "G" for the "M".

If submitting more than two images, just continue with the next number. An example following those above - M_PAE3_Title of Image_Maker's Name.jpg

PhotoShop Tidbits

One of the things that I've found interesting and fun about PhotoShop (PS) is how many different ways there are to accomplish the same thing. Each of us has "our" way that we have found and is comfortable using to get to the end results that we're looking for.

One of the most important items in photography is "contrast". Contrast is what adds depth to our photos. Without contrast, our photos would be flat and uninspiring. Again, there are many ways to accomplish this within PS. I ran across a method using Adobe Camera Raw (ACR) and Lightroom (LR) that I have now started using on a regular basis to adjust contrast.

I've attached a YouTube video by Christopher O'Donnell on why you would not want to just use the Contrast slider in ACR/LR to make contrast adjustments. This video is short and well worth watching. This method adds another tool in the PS toolbelt..... enjoy, Norm

As a fun portion of the BI Photo Club Christmas Party, we will be showing members home grown slide shows as entertainment. Your shows can be on any topic of interest to you. They can be serious, humorous, about travel, your pet cat or any other topic that strikes your fancy. There are no winners or losers, just sharing your life's interests.

A few ground rules for submitting a show:

- 1. Your show should be a maximum of 4-5 minutes in length
- 2. The format for submitting will be the m4v format
- 3. The shows can be color or B/W
- 4. You should allow each image to be on screen for about 4-5 seconds to keep the audiences attention. A 4-minute slide show would include about 60 slides, a 5 minute one, about 75 slides
- 5. To give you an idea of image to music coordination, a show run time should coincide with the length of the music chosen. The run time of each slide can be more or less than 4 seconds to accommodate music that is slightly longer or shorter than the 4 seconds per slide run time.

For submitting your shows:

- 1. E-mail Rob (<u>rcw@kwarch.com</u>) by December 5th to let him know the title of your show and the expected run time. This will help in organizing the total # & length of all the shows for the evening.
- 2. Bring you slide show to the Christmas event on a thumb drive at about 6:30 for us to download to the computer.

Try to join in & showcase your images! Get started early on your show. Our Party is on December 13th at 6:30 PM at the usual place.

ENVIRONMENTAL PORTRAITS by Glen Wyatt – November 1-30 at the "Wall Gallery at the Senior Center
